



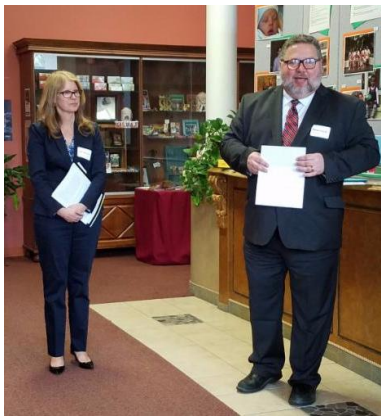

Teen Parent School News

Wing-Benjamin Trust Grant for the Transportation Fund

The [Sharon Abrams Teen Parent School Program](#) runs during the school year with all students commuting. As an alternative school, the local schools are not required to provide transportation. The program has been in existence since 1974 and is open to pregnant and parenting teens statewide with most students living within 40 miles of Waterville. It provides prenatal and parenting instruction along with academic and life skills courses. All students are registered as Waterville High School students and work toward earning a Waterville High School diploma.

Achieving financial and emotional independence is a goal for all participants. Early parenthood can make the journey more challenging, but the guidance and support the program provides makes a world of difference. The aim is to remove as many barriers as possible and build on the strengths of each young parent. Beyond that, our goal is to help teen parents understand the concept of positive parenting, to support and assist them as they learn to deal with challenging issues, and to provide a high-quality and relevant education so they can acquire the knowledge

and skills to move forward in a healthy lifestyle.



Why a transportation fund? We have the capacity each year to serve up to 15-20 pregnant or parenting teens and their children. We have supported more than 1,000 teens since 1974. A long-standing common barrier is transportation to get to and from our campus, as teens must bring car seats, their children, clothing, books and other supplies they will need for the day, something that's not easy to navigate in the best of situations.

The majority of teens we support do not have licenses or vehicles and family transportation is often unreliable. There are few public transportation options for teens to get from their homes to our campus, or schedules that don't fit with the school hours. These barriers have caused a number of teens to back out of our program or to miss school days. We know that the teens are resourceful, but need a little extra support. There isn't one answer that will solve every student's transportation needs so we are committed to developing a fund and will challenge students to be creative. We will invite students to request funding for prepaid gas cards, stipends to reimburse family and friends for cab fares, buses or the Kennebec Explorer, small vehicle repairs or even for support to take driver's education courses. All will foster independence and creativity in developing their own plans. Two goals we plan to track are attendance and new program participants.

Teen Parent Student Summer Support

For the past seven years, Inland Hospital's Community Benefits Program has been sponsoring the Summer Counseling Program for our [Teen Parent School](#) students. The summer program was requested by the girls because they felt they had no support system during vacation.

The counseling program runs for five weeks, every Wednesday for three hours. The teen parents are encouraged to bring their children. There is outdoor play for the mothers and their children, lunch, a craft, and a chance for the director of the Teen Parent School Program to help any of the girls who may be experiencing a challenge.

At the end of the session, most of the girls visit the Development Office to pick up diapers and wipes, clothing, and food that has been donated by the community.

We are very grateful for Inland Hospital's continuing support of this program.

Healthy Northern Kennebec Garden Project Growth

The [Sharon Abrams Teen Parent School Program](#) has been steadily working on the Gardening Collaboration Project. High school students from the Teen Parent School and the Waterville Alternative School have been working with the preschoolers from [The Children's Place](#) to plant seeds, care for seedlings and prepare the raised garden beds for planting. Students will be growing vegetables, herbs and flowers to provide fresh produce for our students and preschoolers. This project is also focused on increasing the students' environmental stewardship through recycling and composting food waste from the cafeteria. The students have also planted flowers and tended the flowerbeds on the grounds of The Maine Children's Home campus. The teen parents will continue to care for the gardens throughout the summer months and assist in harvesting the vegetables. We look forward to working with more community volunteers to learn about preserving our harvest in the fall.

These preserved vegetables will be added to our small food pantry.

This project is possible through a Healthy Waterville Mini Grant provided by Healthy Northern Kennebec, a collaboration with staff from Johnny's Selected Seeds, generous donations from McCormick Building Supplies, supplies purchased through the Albert S. Hall School and Campbell's True Value in Winslow. We are always looking for more volunteers with "green thumbs" to help us expand our knowledge. Summer Camp Appeal

The Maine Children's Home's [Summer Camp Scholarship Program](#) is well underway with 70 scholarships offered to children so far. Campers will soon be packing their bags and backpacks to attend The Friend's Camp, Camp Fairhaven, Camp Mechwana, Camp Susan Curtis or Camp Tracy.

We hope to offer at least 120 scholarships in all as the school year ends and more funding becomes available. The average cost to fund a child attending summer camp is \$250 and can be more depending on the camp. We rely entirely on donations to fund this program.
